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## PRE-CONVENTION WORKSHOPS TO KICK-OFF 1983 ASC ANNUAL MEETING

Travis Hirschi, ASC President, announced that three Pre-Convention Workshops will be held at the Denver Marriott Hotel - City Center from November 7-9, 1983. The series of workshops, a first for the ASC annual program, includes a variety of topics of professional interest. The three sessions will include:

**I. ESTIMATING CASUAL MODELS: An Introduction**, instructed by *Dr. Elton Jackson* of Indiana University, will focus upon methods to estimate the direction and strength of causal effects among sets of variables. Following an introduction to causal modeling, Professor Jackson will cover model identification and various techniques including ordinary least squares, indirect least squares and two-stage least squares. Dr. Jackson is the coauthor of *Inequality in American Communities* and has served as associate, consulting or advisory editor to several sociological and methodological journals.

**II. THE CRIMINAL ARCHIVE AND INFORMATION NETWORK** will be instructed by the staff of the Criminal Justice Archive and Information Network housed at the University of Michigan. *Drs. Michael Traugott* and *Christopher Innes*, from the CJAIN, will focus upon resources available from the archive, alternative modes of access to the data and other CJAIN programs. This presentation will include a demonstration of the remote computer access to the criminal justice data bases. Dr. Traugott is the Director of Resource Development of the Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research and Dr. Innes is the Assistant Director of ICPSR and project manager for the CJAIN.

**III. THE NATURE, USES AND LIMITATIONS OF CRIMINOLOGICAL THEORY**, the third workshop, will have *Dr. Lamar T. Empey* from the University of Southern California as the instructor. Dr. Empey will discuss the values of theory in science and social policy through the evaluation of theory by its logical, empirical and pragmatic adequacy. Dr. Empey maintains that one must always ask the ability of any theory to explain existing "facts". As a

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member of the faculty of the Department of Sociology, Dr. Empey is the author of such works as **American Delinquency: Its Meaning and Construction, The Future of Childhood and Juvenile Justice and The Provo Experiment: Evaluating Community Control of Delinquency.**

The workshops have been kept to the minimal registration fee of \$15.00 for each of the one-day sessions (CJ Archives and Criminological Theory) and \$25.00 for the two-day workshop (Causal Models). Registration information will be mailed to all ASC members and participation will be limited to the first 30 paid applications per workshop. The registration fee is non-refundable. ## EIGHT ANNUAL AAAS COLLOQUIUM ON R&D SLATED FOR MARCH

"R&D, High Technology, and Economic Recovery" will be the theme for the Eighth Annual Colloquium on R&D and Public Policy of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS).

The Colloquium will be held March 24-25, 1983 at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, D.C.

The Colloquium will provide a timely view of research and development in the FY 1984 budget and a look at related trends in federal and industry R&D funding. Speakers will discuss the long and short-term roles of science and technology in economic recovery, both nationally and internationally. The contributions of federal and private sector R&D to new technology and industrial innovation, and the health of the research community also will be addressed.

Leaders from the White House, key federal agencies, Congress, industry, and the scientific and engineering communities will participate in the Colloquium.

A preliminary analysis of R&D in the FY 1984 budget, prepared by AAAS and 15 other scientific, engineering, and educational organizations will be distributed in advance to Colloquium registrants and will provide background material for the meeting. Registrants also will receive a more complete analysis of R&D in the FY 1984 budget, together with a summary of the Colloquium proceedings, after the meeting.

**CALL FOR ENTRIES EXTENDED TO MAY 15****1983 ASC GENE CARTE STUDENT PAPER COMPETITION**

The ASC is soliciting papers from full-time students currently enrolled either in the graduate or undergraduate level for the ASC Gene Carte Student Paper Competition.

All entries must be empirical and/or theoretical papers related to criminology. Papers must be 6,000 words or less, typewritten, double-spaced on 8½ x 11 white paper using standard format. Since papers will be evaluated anonymously, author(s) name(s) and affiliation(s) should appear only on the title page.

Three copies of the paper should be **submitted on or before May 15, 1983**, to: *Professor Dean G. Rojek*, Department of Sociology, Baldwin Hall, University of Georgia, Athens, GA 30602.

Criteria for evaluation of the papers will include significance of the topic, quality of theoretical orientation, methodology, scholarly comprehensiveness and interpretation, quality of writing, and contribution to the field. The author of entries selected by the judges for awards will be notified in writing by August 1, 1983.

The 1st, 2nd and 3rd place papers will be awarded monetary prizes of \$300, \$150, and \$100, respectively, and will be eligible for presentation at the 1983 meeting of The American Society of Criminology in Denver, Colorado, November 9-13. Prize-winning student papers will be integrated with the general sessions of the Society's meeting, according to substantive content. Students also will be acknowledged at the Annual Meeting Awards Ceremony.

**MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER ASC EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETINGS****November 3, 1982 ASC Executive Board Meeting**

President *Harry Allen* called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. *Charles McCaghy*, treasurer, reminded members of the shift from a calendar year to a fiscal year (March 1-February 28 to January 1-December 31). McCaghy reported the financial audit had been completed with only a few minor mechanical changes suggested.

**BOARD MEETINGS**

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**ASC Divisions on International Criminology and Division on Women and Crime:** Each division submitted their proposed constitutions for the Board's approval. A motion was made that divisional dues be collected by the ASC treasurer, who will maintain a list of each division's members, disburse such funds solely for the appropriate division's use (in accord with the divisional and ASC Constitutions) and report these transactions to the ASC Executive Board. A motion was made that each division of the Society be authorized to name a member to the Annual Meeting Program Committee. The Executive Board requested both divisions to review and revise their proposed constitutions in a way which is consistent with the constitution of ASC.

**Resolution on Interdisciplinary Programs:** The resolution, prepared by *Harold E. Pepinsky*, was discussed and described as in need of careful editing. A motion was made that the Board approve in principle an edited version of the statement on interdisciplinary programs and that the edited version be prepared by the President for approval by the Executive Board.

**ASC Committee Reports:** *Chris Eskridge*, Membership Committee, reported that the Society has approximately the same number of members today as it had last year (1,830 to 1,890). *Barbara R. Price* reported for the Publications Committee that the search for an editor of *THE CRIMINOLOGIST* had resulted in the nomination of *John Kramer* of Pennsylvania State University for a three-year appointment which was approved by the Executive Board.

**Local ASC Chapters:** *Marilyn Slivka* reported on her inquiry into the possibility of a local ASC chapter in Philadelphia. Responses to an informal survey indicated interest by a good cross-section of ASC members in the area. Twenty-one people met for the area's first local meeting and another meeting is scheduled for January to discuss problems in obtaining access to criminal justice data.

**Archives Report:** *Charles Wellford* reported that the Grants and Contracts Committee had studied the possibilities of outside funding for a project to establish an archive section at Ohio State University. The Committee is ready to move ahead but required direction from the Board regarding the materials to be included, the purpose of the archive, and materials ready for inclusion. The matters will be reviewed by *Travis Hirschi* and *Wellford* and a proposal will be given at the next Executive Board meeting.

**1982-83 Presidential Appointments:** President-Elect *Hirschi* announced his appointments which were approved by the Board. (Appointments appeared in the January issue of *THE CRIMINOLOGIST*.)

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**November 5, 1982 ASC Annual Business Meeting Minutes**

President Allen called the Business Meeting to order at 3:30 p.m. *James K. "Chip" Stuart*, National Institute of Justice, discussed the range of new initiatives and priorities which his agency was considering, and proposed closer ties between the academic and practitioner groups.

*Israel Barak-Glantz* reported that over 725 persons were registered for the convention and thanked the Program Committee as well as the Local Arrangements Committee, noting that the work of the 1982 Chairperson had been extremely eased by the active collaboration of both committees.

*Charles McCaghy* gave the Treasurer's report, noting that the Society was solvent, and that it would not be necessary to raise dues at this time. Allen thanked McCaghy for his years of service to the Society and announced that the new Treasurer would be J. Robert Lilly.

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**BOARD MEETINGS**

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President Allen announced the outcomes of the elections: President Elect, *Albert Reiss, Jr.*; Vice President-Elect, *Austin Turk*; and *James Inciardi* and *Joan Petersilia*, Executive Counselors. *Gordon Waldo* has been named to serve the last year of *Austin Turk's* three-year Executive Counselor term.

*Joe Scott*, 1983 Program Chairperson, announced the plans for the 35th Annual Meeting to be held in Denver, Colorado. The theme is to be "The Causes and Consequences of Crime: Multidisciplinary Contributions." Call for Papers were distributed in the Toronto packets.

President Allen announced that the Board had tentatively approved the development of two divisions within the Society — The Division on International Criminology and the Division on Women and Crime. The next Board meeting will consider the formalization of both divisions.

President Allen expressed the Society's appreciation to *Alvin W. Cohn*, who has resigned after seven years as editor of the newsletter and announced that *John Kramer*, Pennsylvania State University, has been selected as the new editor.

*Edward Latessa*, Chair, ASC Site Selection Committee, reported that the committee is recommending Chicago, Illinois as the site for the 1987 Annual Meeting.

The floor was opened for new business, and *Tony Platt* raised the issue of the Society's policy regarding exhibitors at any convention. As he was exhibiting for a non-profit organization, he did not feel that he or any other non-profit organization should pay the same exhibit fees as publishing houses designed for profit. *Platt* moved and *Harold E. Pepinsky* seconded a motion for reconsideration by the Executive Board of the exhibit fees for non-profit organizations, with the proviso that the new policy to be proposed would go forward through *Harold Pepinsky*. Motion carried. *Pepinsky* will present his proposal to the Board at the February meeting. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:30 p.m.

**November 6, 1982 Executive Board Meeting Minutes**

President *Hirschi* called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

1983 Program Chair, *Joseph E. Scott*, reported that the room rates quoted by the Denver Hilton were not acceptable to him and that he was renegotiating for lower room rates. Workshops are tentatively scheduled for Monday and Tuesday before the beginning of the Annual Meeting on Wednesday. *Scott* noted the five major areas of the program are: (1) the Criminal Justice System; (2) Criminal Policy: Formulation, Implementation and Evaluation; (3) Criminological Research Issues and Specialized Topics; (4) Criminological Theory, and (5) Multidisciplinary and Interdisciplinary Approaches to Criminology. Deadline for submitting papers is May 1, 1983.

*Richard Ball*, chair of the Finance Committee, distributed copies of the proposed 1983 budget which was approved by the Board.

*Marguerite Q. Warren*, chair of the Publications Committee, reported that Sage Publications has expressed dissatisfaction with the Sage Research Progress Series. A motion to consider Sage's suggestion for "symposium" volumes was approved by the Board. A new editor of *CRIMINOLOGY* will be needed and the Publications Committee will begin their search immediately.

The Site Selection Committee recommended Chicago, Illinois, as the site for the 1987 Annual Meeting which was approved by the Board.

The Division on Women and Crime presented their revised Constitution for consideration. The Board approved the revised Constitution with an amendment to #VII-Dues, noting subject to approval of the Executive Board of The American Society of Criminology.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

## I.) ESTIMATING CAUSAL MODELS: AN INTRODUCTION

November 7th (1pm-5pm), November 8th (8am-5pm) and November 9th (8am-noon), 1983.

**Dr. Elton F. Jackson**

Indiana University

This workshop will provide an introduction to, and practice in working with, statistical methods to estimate the direction and strength of causal effects among a set of variables.

The workshop will include: (1) a general introduction to causal models, including expressing models (both recursive and nonrecursive) as causal diagrams and in terms of structural equations; (2) how to make sure that your model is identifiable (that is, that estimates of the effects can actually be obtained); and (3) several different ways to obtain estimates of the effects specified by the theory, including ordinary least squares (path analysis estimation), indirect least squares, and two-stage least squares.

The workshop assumes that participants have a working knowledge of multiple regression.

Dr. Jackson is the former chair, and current faculty member, of the Department of Sociology at Indiana University. He has published extensively in the area of measurement and the use of multiple indicators in survey research. He is the coauthor of *Inequality in American Communities* and has served as associate, consulting or advisory editor for the *American Sociological Review*, *American Journal of Sociology*, *Sociometry* and *Sociological Methodology*.

Participants will examine a number of concerns in criminological theory. For example, it has become fashionable to argue that attempts to explain crime are fruitless. They have no value, neither for science nor for social policy. Throughout history, however, age, gender, race, social class and type of community have been consistently associated with arrest, self reported commission of criminal acts and victimization. Fashionable assumptions notwithstanding, certain repeated and observable "facts" demand explanation.

Applying three major criteria for evaluating any theory—namely, its logical, empirical and pragmatic adequacy—this workshop will be devoted to an examination of criminological theory. How well does it explain existing "facts"? Does it have value either for science or social policy?

Professor Empey has written extensively on the topic of criminological theory. He is the author or coauthor of numerous books, including: *American Delinquency: Its Meaning and Construction*, *The Future of Childhood and Juvenile Justice*, *The Provo Experiment: Evaluating Community Control of Delinquency* and *The Silver Lake Experiment: Testing Delinquency Theory and Community Intervention*.
