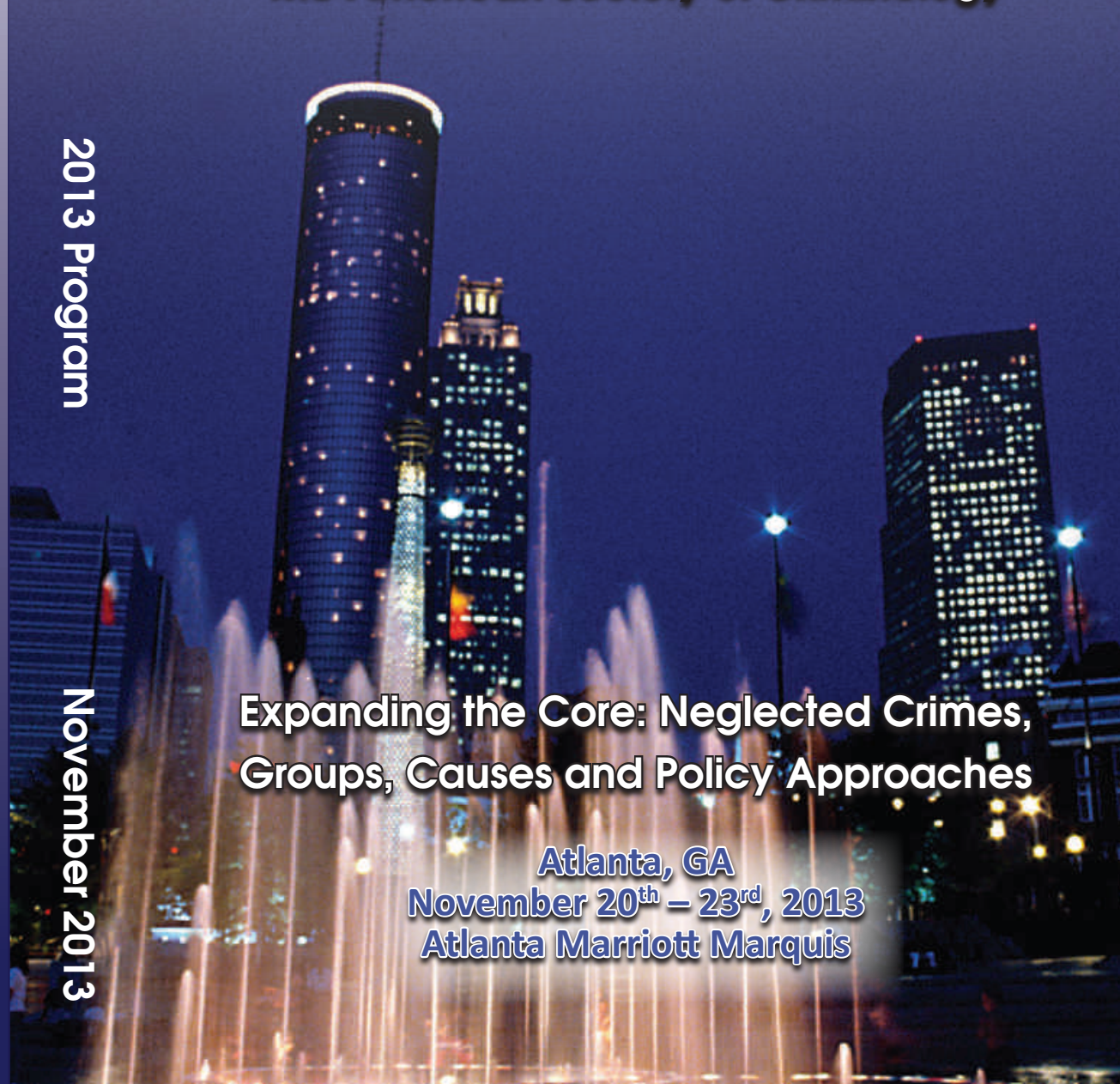

## ***WELCOME TO THE 2013 ASC MEETING!***

It is our pleasure to welcome you to Atlanta. We hope you find this year's program to be as rich and engaging as ever and truly enjoy your stay. This year's meeting is packed with inviting sessions—over 800 sessions have been scheduled. We trust that you will find many stimulating sessions in your areas of interest. Below, we highlight just a few of the many offerings.

The theme for the meeting is **Expanding the Core: Neglected Crimes, Groups, Causes, and Policy Approaches**. Criminologists from a variety of perspectives have argued for an expansion of the core or “mainstream” criminology. For example, they have called for greater attention to harmful acts beyond those legally defined as crimes (including acts committed by states), an examination of causal factors beyond those that now dominate research (including bi-psychological factors and societal characteristics), more complete consideration of the ways that gender, race/ethnicity, and sexual orientation relate to crime and victimization, greater attention to crime in non-Western nations, and more direct involvement in the policy-making process and with practitioners.

The two plenary sessions at the meetings will highlight the program theme, as well as reflect Atlanta's reputation as the “cradle of the Civil Rights Movement.” The opening plenary will take place on **Wednesday at 11am** (Marquis Ballroom B) and will feature **Ambassador Andrew Young**, one of the principal lieutenants to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; Congressman; Ambassador to the United Nations; Mayor of Atlanta; and now co-chair of Good Works International. The closing plenary will take place on **Saturday at 11:30am** (Marquis Ballroom B) and will feature **Congressman John Lewis**, who, as Chair of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, helped organize many of the key activities of the Civil Rights Movement. Despite more than 40 arrests and numerous attacks, he has remained a lifelong advocate of nonviolence. He will receive the President's Justice Award at his presentation.

In addition, there are ten **Presidential Panels**, with panelists discussing why it is important for criminologists to expand the core in the ways indicated. The panels are spread throughout the conference and will be held in the Marquis Ballrooms on the main floor.

And please mark your calendars for the following sessions and events:

A **New Member Welcome and Mentoring Reception** will take place at **Wednesday at 2pm** (International B). New members will be welcomed by ASC officers and others and an orientation to the meetings will be provided. This reception is cosponsored by the Student Affairs and Mentoring Committees.

An opportunity to **Meet the President and President Elect Friday 2pm;** (A601). To help increase the responsiveness and transparency of the ASC, President Robert Agnew and President Elect Joanne Belknap will hear your concerns, take your suggestions, and answer your questions.

Numerous sessions involving key figures in the policy arena, including the **National Institute of Justice Director, Greg Ridgeway;** the **Bureau of Justice Statistics Director, William Sabol;** and a **Meet and Greet Session with the Assistant Attorney General for the Office of Justice Programs, Karol Mason.**

**Friday 5pm Presidential Address**, titled: “Social Concern and Crime: Moving beyond the Assumption of Simple Self-Interest” (Marquis Ballroom), followed by a Presidential Reception. An evening of fun and fund-raising will kick off at 9pm with the return of the **Hot Spots** at the Minority Fellowship Dance, followed by Atlanta’s own **Ruby Velle and the Soulphonics.**

We only have space here to mention a few main events. **There are many other great sessions at the meetings and we urge you to examine the Program carefully.** Please note there are also a number of attractions within a short distance of the conference hotel, including the King Center, Centennial Olympic Park, the Georgia Aquarium (the world’s largest), the World of Coca Cola, CNN, and Skyview Atlanta – a giant Ferris wheel.
