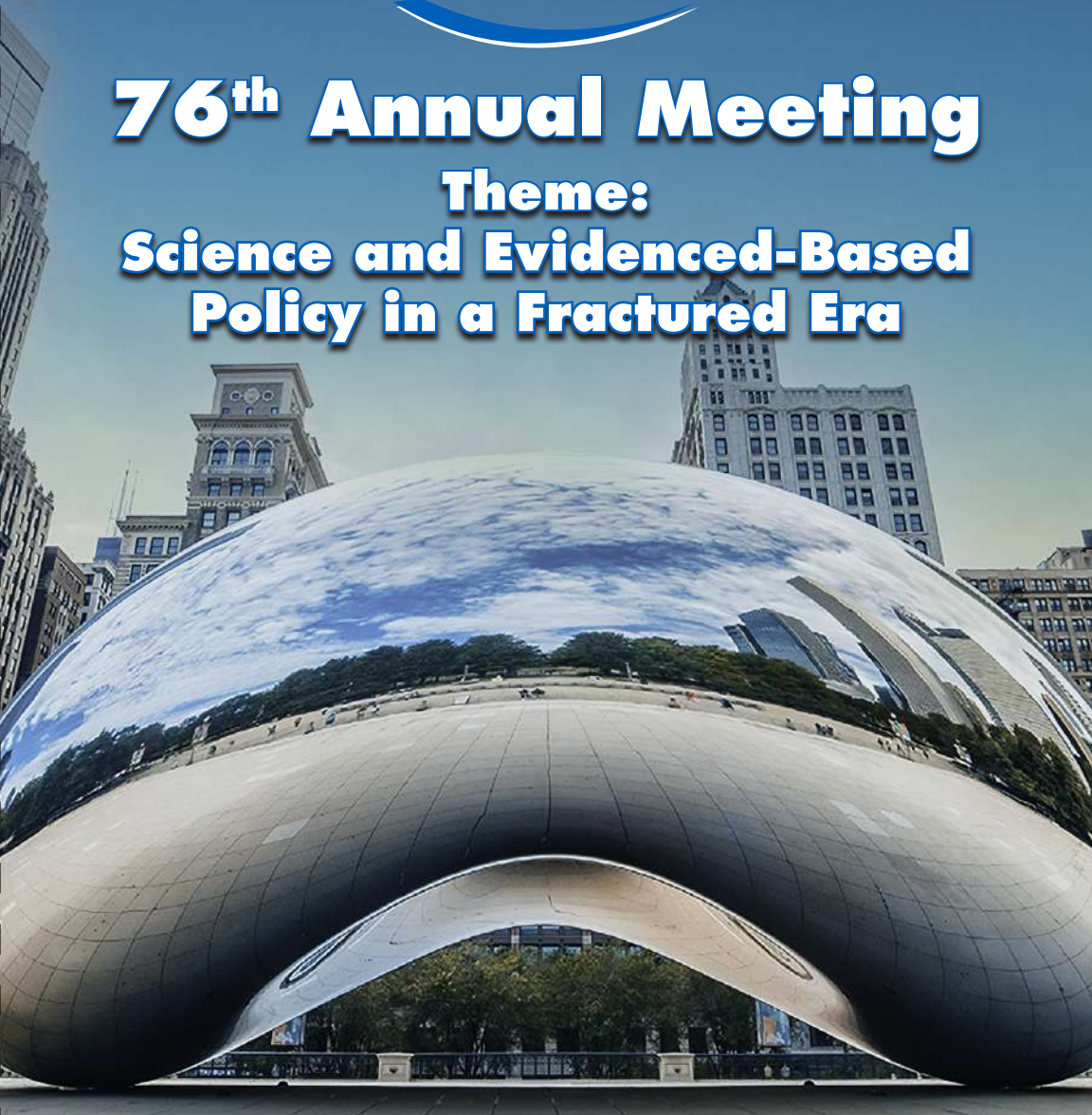

WELCOME TO CHICAGO!

It is with great pleasure that we welcome you to Chicago for the ASC's 2021 annual conference from Nov. 17-20 – particularly in light of our having to cancel the 2020 conference due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The theme of the conference, *Science and Evidence-Based Policy in a Fractured Era*, is our effort to think through how criminology can contribute to evidence-based public policy in an era marked by extreme partisanship, and by beliefs about what constitutes scientifically based evidence that are so divergent as to constitute alternative realities. A byproduct of extreme partisanship and divergent realities is an unwillingness to consider balancing competing interests, a requirement vital to an effectively functioning democracy. The legal and political battles over mask wearing and vaccination requirements in the COVID era exemplify the social dysfunction that is gripping the USA and many other countries throughout the world.

The Presidential Panels are intended to be exemplars of how criminology can and should constructively engage three important policy questions concerning crime and criminal justice in this fractured era. All will be moderated discussions. The first panel, titled, “Reimagining American Public Safety” (Wed., Nov. 17, 12:30-1:15), will be moderated by Cynthia Lum (George Mason University) and include participants Tarrick McGuire (Deputy Chief of the Arlington, TX Police Department), Laurie Robinson (George Mason University and co-chair of President Obama’s Commission on 21st Century Policing), and Walter Katz (Arnold Ventures). As the title suggests, this group will discuss the major reforms in policing in the USA that are required to transform the perception of police in many communities, particularly those that are predominantly minority, from an occupying force not to be trusted to partners in the creation of public safety.

A second panel titled, “New Perspectives on the Risk Assessment Paradigm”, (Thursday, Nov. 18, 11-12:30), moderated by Jens Ludwig (University of Chicago and Director of the Crime Lab), will feature Rayid Ghani (Carnegie Mellon University), Robert Sampson (Harvard University), and Tracie Mearns (Yale University). The panelists will explore the promise and perils of the use of

risk assessment instruments in the criminal justice system for improving fairness and reducing bias in decision making in policing (e.g., police deployment), the courts (e.g., bail and sentencing), and corrections (e.g., parole).

A third panel titled, “Unraveling Mass Incarceration—Prospects and Obstacles” (Friday, 12:30-1:50) will be moderated by Carrie Johnson (National Public Radio Justice Correspondent) and include panelists John Fetterman (Pennsylvania Lt. Governor), Michael Fisher (US Appeals Court Judge and former Pennsylvania Attorney General and State Senator), and Claire Shubik-Richards (President of the Pennsylvania Prison Society). This group will discuss the challenges of unraveling mass incarceration with a particular emphasis on our nation’s disproportionate use of life imprisonment in the context of the political dynamics of a single state – Pennsylvania. As the late Tip O’Neal, former Speaker of the US House of Representatives, said, “All politics is local.” But we add that Pennsylvania is a microcosm of the other 49 states and therefore of interest to the much wider audience that will be in attendance.

We hope that you will also consider attending the Presidential Address, which will build upon the Unraveling Mass Incarceration panel and on the important work of the Sentencing Project on the critical need to scale back the use of life imprisonment, not only for unraveling mass incarceration but also for advancing the goal of just sentencing. As befitting this theme, the address will be preceded by recorded remarks from Bryan Stevenson, Director of the Equal Justice Initiative and the 2021 recipient of the President’s Justice Award.

Last, but not least, we are incredibly grateful to all of our colleagues and friends who served on the program committee, the local arrangements committee, and who helped organize plenaries, panels, and policy sessions to showcase their important work. Over 100 ASC members stepped up to serve in these crucial roles, even though we put out the call late in March 2020 as the realities of COVID-19 in the USA and elsewhere were starting to become clear. It would truly be impossible to put together a program of this size and scope without you. We want to express special thanks to the ASC staff, especially Chris Eskridge and the incredible Susan Case, who worked tirelessly and with good humor despite the incredibly challenging conditions this year to organize the conference and keep the arrangements running as smoothly as possible. The 2021 annual meeting will surely be unlike any other as we continue to navigate an uncertain and fractured world, and our conference theme becomes more

relevant than we could possibly have imagined two years ago. We hope it will provide a long-awaited opportunity for our community to come together again and share our evidence-based and innovative ideas to advance criminal justice reform, even as we will miss our many colleagues in the US and around the world who will still not be able to join us in person this year. CODE OF CONDUCT

Introduction

As an organization, we uphold our Code of Ethics (approved March 2016). Section II #5 of the Code states, “In their professional activities, ASC members are committed to enhancing the general well-being of societies and of the individuals and groups within them. Thus, ASC members have an obligation to avoid forms of social injustice such as discrimination, oppression, or harassment.” Section II #10 of the Code states, “ASC members do not force, coerce, or obtain through manipulation personal favors, sexual activity or economic or professional advantages from any person including faculty, students, research respondents, clients, patients, research assistants, clerical staff or colleagues. ASC members will not engage in workplace harassment, aggression, or bullying of any kind.”

We remind all participants in ASC activities during the annual meeting that the Code of Ethics will be upheld so that all its members enjoy a welcoming environment free from unlawful discrimination, harassment and retaliation. We refer to this as the Code of Conduct.

Application
