WELCOME TO ATLANTA!

We are pleased to welcome you to Atlanta for the 2022 annual conference of the American Society of Criminology. The theme of this year's conference – *The Future of Criminology* – is intended to prompt thoughtful discussions about how criminology can best contribute to an ongoing understanding of crime and social control in an era marked by numerous social, technological, and environmental changes. The nature of crime and social control is ever-changing and ensuring the relevance of our work in the context of growing public distrust of science, academia, and political decision-makers will be challenging. Other critical national and global issues that we face (such as climate change, pandemics, the criminalization of women's reproductive decisions, social and economic inequalities, and threats to democracy) implore us to consider the importance of how macro-social and historical conditions challenge our work now and into the future.

The Presidential Panels were created to highlight some of these issues. The first panel was initially developed by Sally Simpson during her Presidency, but this panel could not be held because of the cancellation of the 2020 meeting. "*The Trump Aftermath: The Future of Criminology in a Divided Nation*" (Wed., Nov. 16, 12:30-1:50 pm), will include papers about how the transformation of the American political and regulatory landscape during the Trump administration created new possibilities for both retail and wholesale crimes by elites. Presenters will discuss how we might create a criminology that is more fully and effectively focused upon crimes and social harms emanating from centers of political and economic power. Chaired by Raymond Michalowski (Northern Arizona University), the panel includes presentations by: Henry Pontell (John Jay College); John Hagan (Northwestern University) and Bill McCarthy (Rutgers University-Newark); Raymond Michalowski and Rebecca Annorbah (Northern Arizona University); and Francis T. Cullen

(University of Cincinnati) and Teresa C. Kulig (University of Nebraska at Omaha). Lauren Snider (Queen's University) will serve as discussant.

The second panel is titled, "*Data and Research Priorities in Federal Agencies: Visions for the Future*" (Thursday, Nov. 17, 12:30-1:50 pm). This panel features the current directors of key federal agencies charged with improving the nation's understanding of crime and violence by supporting evidence-based research and government responses to these issues. Speakers include James A. Mercy (Director of the Division of Violence Prevention, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention); Nancy La Vigne (Director of the National Institute of Justice, U.S. Department of Justice); and Alex Piquero (Director of the Bureau of Justice Statistics, U.S. Department of Justice). The panel will provide members of the audience with the opportunity to ask questions of the panel members. Janet Lauritsen (University of Missouri-St. Louis) will serve as moderator of this panel.

The third panel is titled *The Future of Crime Policy: Where Might the Evidence Take Us?* (Friday, Nov. 18, 12:30-1:50 pm). Presenters at this panel will discuss what the research evidence tells us about future policy priorities for addressing issues of violent crime, police accountability, and racial disparities in the justice system. Chaired by Adam Gelb (Council on Criminal Justice), the panel includes presentations by: Thomas Abt (Council on Criminal Justice) on violent crime reduction; Thaddeus Johnson and William Sabol (Georgia State University) on equity in the justice system; and by Robin Engel (University of Cincinnati) on police accountability.

We hope that you will also consider attending the Presidential Address (Friday, Nov. 18, 5:00-6:20 pm), which will argue that the future of criminology will be stronger to the degree that it pays closer attention to macro-social historical conditions, expanding our crime data infrastructure, and responses to experiences of victimization. The presidential address will be preceded by the awarding of the President's Award for Distinguished Contributions to Justice. The recipient of the

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2022 Award is the Alliance for Safety and Justice (ASJ) (<https://allianceforsafetyandjustice.org/>). The ASJ has done much over the years to incorporate victims' voices and experiences into discussions about safety and justice. Lenore Anderson, President of the ASJ, will accept the Award and deliver remarks about her organization before the Presidential Address.

Finally, we are incredibly appreciative of all of our colleagues and friends who volunteered their time and energy to serve on the ASC program committee, the local arrangements committee, and the ASC awards and standing committees this year. Thank you for your hard work and for agreeing to serve at a time when there was still much uncertainty about the logistics of travel. We want to express special thanks to the ASC staff, especially Chris Eskridge, the ever-tireless Susan Case and Sheena Hensley, without whom managing a program of this size and scope would truly be impossible. We hope this year's meeting will be intellectually stimulating and exciting and will mark a return for those of you who have been unable to attend the annual meeting in the past two years. We look forward to seeing everyone in Atlanta!

CODE OF CONDUCT

Introduction

As an organization, we uphold our Code of Ethics (approved March 2016). Section II #5 of the Code states, “In their professional activities, ASC members are committed to enhancing the general well-being of societies and of the individuals and groups within them. Thus, ASC members have an obligation to avoid forms of social injustice such as discrimination, oppression, or harassment.” Section II #10 of the Code states, “ASC members do not force, coerce, or obtain through manipulation personal favors, sexual activity or economic or professional advantages from any person including faculty, students, research respondents, clients, patients, research assistants, clerical staff or colleagues. ASC members will not engage in workplace harassment, aggression, or bullying of any kind.”

We remind all participants in ASC activities during the annual meeting that the Code of Ethics will be upheld so that all its members enjoy a welcoming environment free from unlawful discrimination, harassment and retaliation. We refer to this as the Code of Conduct.

Application

This policy applies to all participants in ASC activities, including but not limited to event attendees, professionals, students, guests, staff, contractors, exhibitors, and participants in scientific sessions, on tours, and other social events of any ASC meeting or other activity.

Expected Conduct
