While the area of specialization is open for this search, the College of Juvenile Justice anticipates starting a Master of Public Policy program. Therefore, preference will be given to applicants who have a substantive strength in public policy, justice policy, social policy, etc. Applicants must hold a Ph.D. in Criminal Justice, Criminology, Juvenile Justice, Public Policy, or a closely related field. Applicants with only a J.D. degree will not be considered.

Job Qualifications and Duties

- Have an established scholarly record appropriate for a tenured associate professor at a Carnegie R2 (high research) university
- Have an active record of scholarship in areas related to public policy
- Make original contributions to the advancement of knowledge through scholarly publications and presentations.
- Have a record of seeking and/or obtaining external funding
- Have a record of excellent teaching at the undergraduate and graduate levels
- Plan, prepare, and teach courses at the undergraduate and graduate levels
- Assess student performance, provide timely feedback, and evaluate student learning outcomes to inform teaching practices and curriculum improvements.
- Engage in ongoing professional development activities to stay current in the field, improve teaching skills, and explore new instructional strategies.
- Collaborate with colleagues to coordinate course offerings and contribute to program development and improvement.
- Mentor doctoral students
- Participate in institutional service roles including department/college/university committees
